Located in the most diverse community and environment in the world, the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa is a globally recognized center of learning and research with a kuleana to serve the people and places of Hawai'i, and our neighbors in the Pacific and Asia. We cultivate creative and innovative leaders who mālama our people, our places, and our ways of knowing in order to sustain and transform our islands and the world.

Established in 1907, the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa is the largest and oldest of the 10 UH campuses. Mānoa offers hundreds of undergraduate, graduate and professional degrees; a strong, vital research program; and nationally ranked NCAA Division I athletics. UH Mānoa is a research university of international standings.

UH Mānoa has widely recognized strengths in tropical agriculture, tropical medicine, oceanography, astronomy, electrical engineering, volcanology, evolutionary biology, comparative philosophy, comparative religion, Hawaiian studies, Asian studies, Pacific Islands studies, and Asian and Pacific region public health. UH Mānoa offers instruction in more languages than any U.S. institution outside the Department of State. The main UH campus located in Mānoa Valley on the island of O'ahu began in 1907 as a land-grant college of agriculture and mechanic arts. With the addition of a College of Arts and Sciences in 1920, the college became the University of Hawai'i. In 1972, it became UH Mānoa to distinguish it from the other units in the growing UH system.





Position Summary

Assistant Vice Provost for Student Diversity & Inclusion

The Assistant Vice Provost for Student Diversity & Inclusion is one of the student officers and policy advisors to the Vice Provost for Student Success on student diversity and inclusion matters and provides the leadership, direction, planning, and coordination of the units and programs supporting student diversity and inclusion as well as collaborating with other assistant vice provosts and directors on programs to ensure overarching campus goals and objectives are achieved. The Assistant Vice Provost for Student Diversity & Inclusion is a leadership team member for the Vice Provost for Student Success and the Provost's Council.

Student Diversity and Inclusion provides leadership for planning, directing, coordinating, and managing student service areas that promote diversity, supporting minoritized students and traditionally underrepresented and underserved in higher education, and facilitating access to the UH Manoa through its program, activities, and community partnerships. Current federal and state programs provide college access, opportunities, and services to students from multicultural backgrounds with disabilities and are LGBTQ+, veterans, Native Hawaiians, underrepresented ethnic groups, low-income and disadvantaged students, student parents, or a combination of more than one group.

Campus Student Diversity Administrator and Policy Advisor

Serves as the campus student diversity administrator and policy advisor on student diversity and inclusion, educational equity, minority support programs, and other related activities. Provides leadership in developing policies, procedures, and best practices related to assigned areas and institutional, divisional, and program goals and objectives. Promotes diversity, equality, and affirmative action in all aspects of student diversity and inclusion programs and support of campus mission.

Leads and manages student diversity and inclusion-related programs and building of supportive student culture through the implementation of the institutional philosophy that drives and supports student and their success from admissions to graduation; development of applicable internal policies, procedures, and practices; and the implementation of student program planning, performance, and management; and the effective allocation of resources to meet program objectives. Recommends, establishes, and implements new student success programs and strengthens existing programs in consideration of national and local trends of student needs.

Assists the Vice Provost and campus leadership in the implementation and management of goals and objectives related to student success programs to improve the quality, direction, and priorities of student diversity and inclusion that also complements student success programs as well as teaching, research, and administration in full compliance with accreditation and higher education standards and requirements. Assists with fostering a vibrant student campus and academic climate, cultivating a student success environment where effective, innovative, and creative student services may flourish.

Collaboration and Relations

Works with and interacts with other student officers/counterparts and deans, directors and administrators from UH Manoa and other campuses; governance representatives from student, faculty, staff, and Native Hawaiian governance groups; and business and community partners and other constituencies and internal and external organizations.

Develops and oversees agreements, partnerships, and exchanges with other internal units and, as appropriate, other educational institutions and organizations across the UH System, nationally and internationally. Represents, promotes, and advances UH Manoa in working with state, national, and international organizations and represents and promotes campus student success, specifically student diversity, and inclusion, to stakeholders, serving as the official representative of the Vice Provost for Student Success as appropriate.

Assists in establishing a student culture where becoming a Native Hawaiian Place of Learning, a Truth, Racial Healing, and Transformation (TRHT) Campus Center, and diversity is encouraged and where students learn to respect differences, take responsibility for their actions, and exercise leadership through the Native Hawaiian principles of mo'okū'auhau, kaikua'ana, and kaikaina, and the kuleana to hanai, ho'omalu and malama.




Honolulu, Hawai'i

The University of Hawai'i at Mānoa is located in Mānoa Valley, minutes from downtown Honolulu. The JABSOM campus is located on the island of O'ahu approximately three miles west of the University of Hawai'i Mānoa campus in Kaka'ako, adjacent to Kaka'ako Waterfront Park near downtown Honolulu.

Honolulu is the largest city and the capital of the state of Hawai'i. Incorporated as a city in 1907, Honolulu refers to the urban area on the southeastern shore of the island of O'ahu. In the Hawaiian language, Honolulu means "sheltered bay" or "place of shelter."

Today, Honolulu is one of America's safest cities with many unique features and characteristics. It's home to America's only royal palace and is known for its tropical climate, lush green landscape, diverse population, and community spirit known as aloha.
